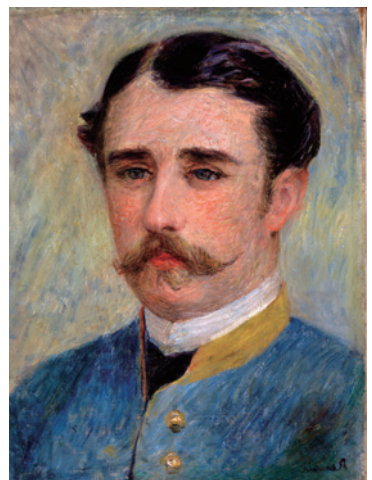

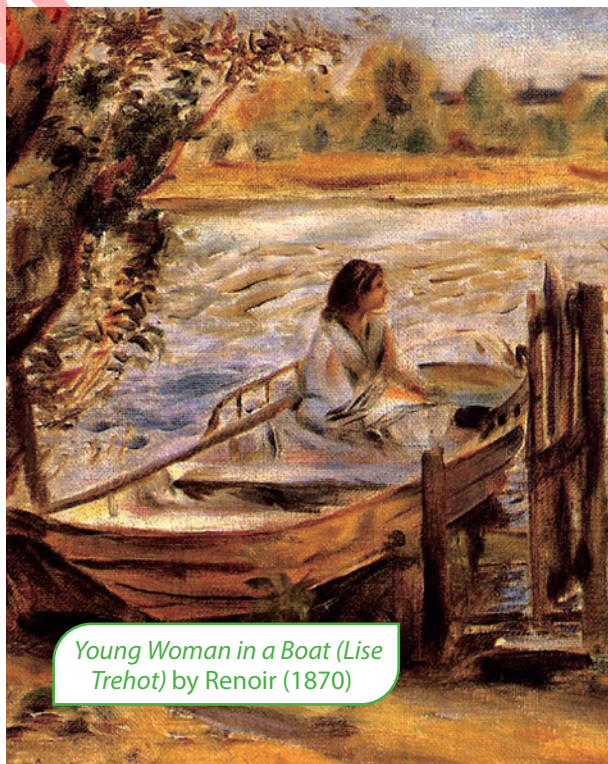
Early Life

Renoir was born in Limoges, France, on February 25, 1841. His parents made and fixed clothes. When he was three years old, his family moved to Paris. There, they lived very close to the Louvre!

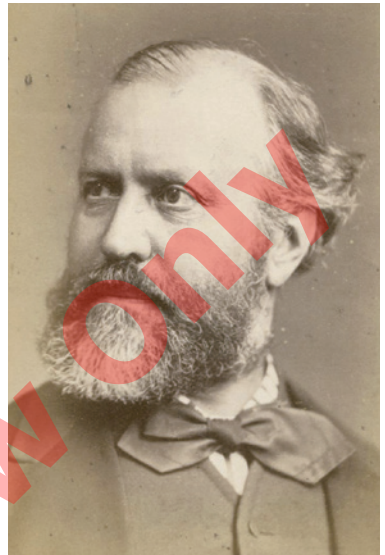

Renoir showed a natural talent for drawing at an early age. But his talent for singing was even greater. However, when he was 13, he had to stop music lessons. He left school to work in order to help his family.

Renoir worked at a shop for a porcelain painter. He copied designs onto plates and bowls. The painter liked Renoir's work, so he encouraged him to take art lessons.

In 1861, when he was 20 years old, Renoir studied at Charles Gleyre's studio. Gleyre taught the young artist techniques to paint people.

Renoir also met Alfred Sisley, Claude Monet, and other artists at Gleyre's studio. Over time, they became friends. A year later, Renoir began studying at the famous École des Beaux-Arts in Paris.
