

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
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Some farmers keep cattle for their milk. Other farmers keep cattle for meat.

Female cattle are called cows and male cattle are called bulls.

Baby cattle are called calves.



Cattle have hair all over their bodies. The hair can be black, brown or white.

Cattle can have long or short horns, or they may have no horns at all.

Cattle have four **hooves**and each hoof has two toes.
The hooves make it easier
for cattle to walk on bumpy ground.



Calves

When a calf is born, its mother licks it all over to make it clean.

Then the calf is warm and dry.

The calf tries to stand up on its long, wobbly legs.

A calf can stand up a short time after it is born.






Soon, the new calf is able to walk, too.
It is very hungry,
so it walks to its mother to drink her milk.

Young calves need lots of milk because they grow very fast.

What Cattle Eat

Cattle eat grass by pulling it into their mouths with their tongues.


Then they break it off with their teeth.



Sometimes, in long, hot summers or cold winters, there is not enough grass for the cattle to eat.

Farmers have to feed them dry grass, called hay, or grains that have been mixed together.

Cattle need fresh water to drink, too.
