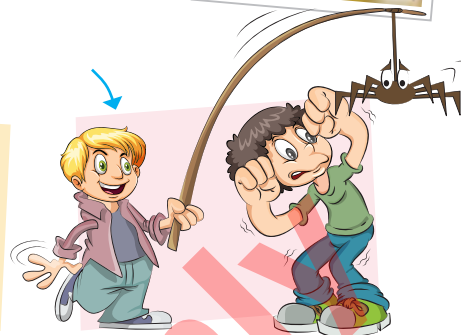

You need:



Soak the ice lolly sticks in water for a few hours. They have to become bendable.



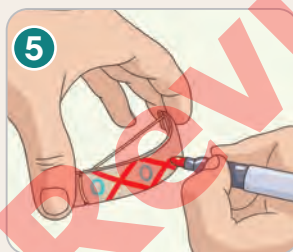
Check the ice lolly stick to see if they have become softer. If they have, use the scissors to cut two small but deep slits at the end of each.



When the ice lolly sticks are soft enough, take them out of the water and start bending them. Start from the middle and go to the edges. Be very careful while bending them not to crack them.



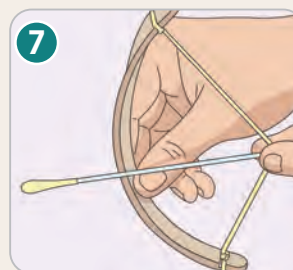
When the bow is at the shape you want, cut a piece of fishing line or dental floss and tie it around the slits you have cut on the ice lolly sticks.



Cut the extra line and tuck it into the wrapped line. Use the markers to make designs on your bows as you like.



Use the scissors to cut one edge of the cotton buds or the toothpicks. This side will work as the flat side to have your bow work and shoot the arrows.



Your bows and arrows are ready. You can even use ice lolly sticks of different colours for the bows of each army. You can also put marshmallows on the pointy edge of the arrows and enjoy at a campfire party!
