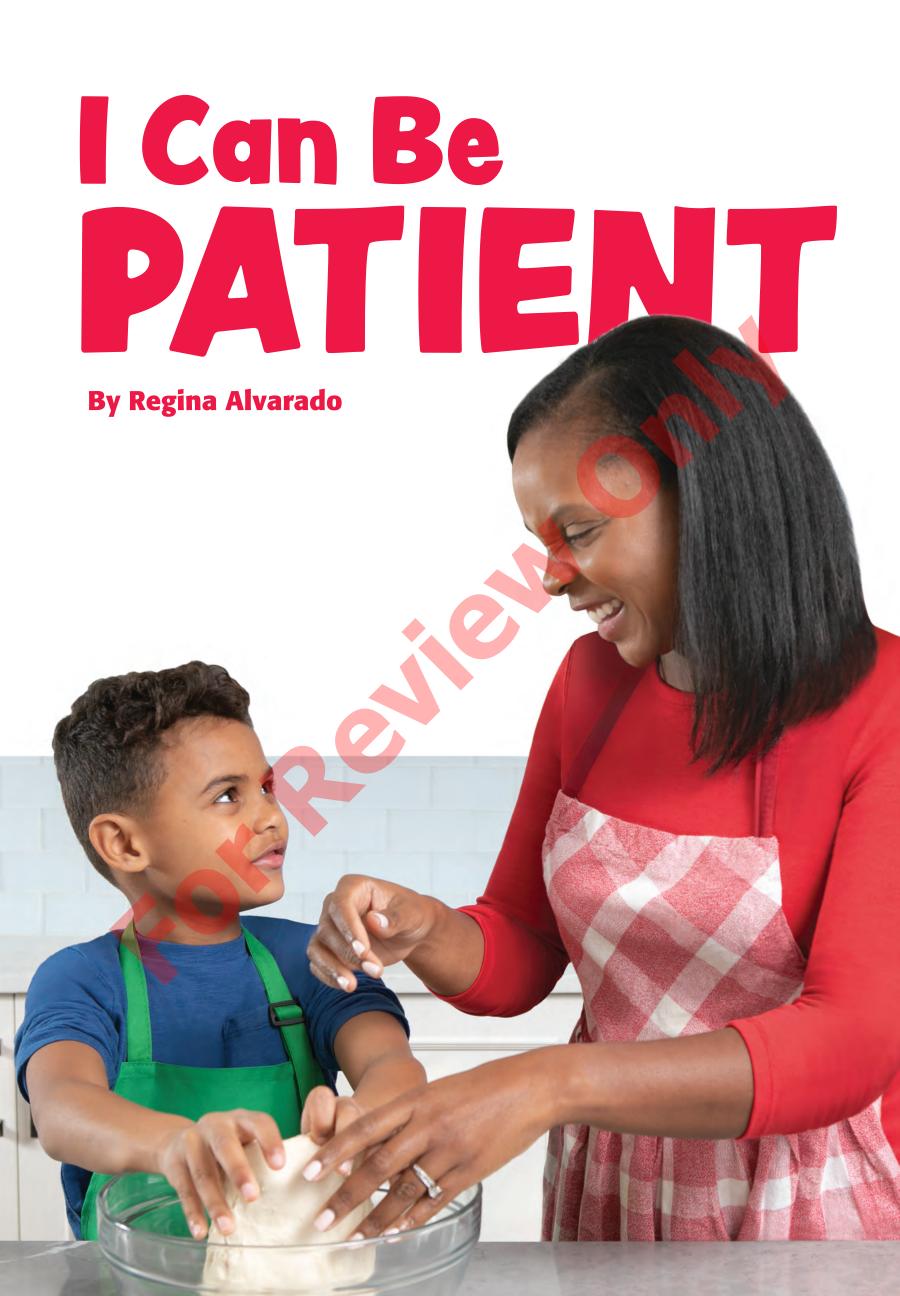

How to Read This Book with Children

- Read aloud the title. Discuss what it means to be patient.
- 2 Read aloud the book with children.
- Talk about the importance of being patient and waiting for things we want.
- 4 Ask children to describe what Dash learns over the course of the story.
- After reading, use the Real-World Wrap-Up prompts to discuss the photograph.
- 6 Guide children to connect to the story to their own experiences.
