SET THEME:

Build Social and Emotional Intelligence

To help children appreciate differences and show empathy and compassion:

- Encourage them to understand and recognize others with different needs.
- Help them interact with others who have different needs and abilities.
- Ask them to share how they can help others facing challenges.

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How to Read This Book with Children

- 1 Read aloud the title. Discuss how people see differently.
- 2 Read aloud the book with children.
- 3 Talk about ways children see differently in the book.
- 4 Ask children to describe the different activities the characters enjoy doing.
- 5 After reading, use the Real-World Wrap-Up prompts to discuss the photograph.
- 6 Guide children to connect the story to their own experiences.
