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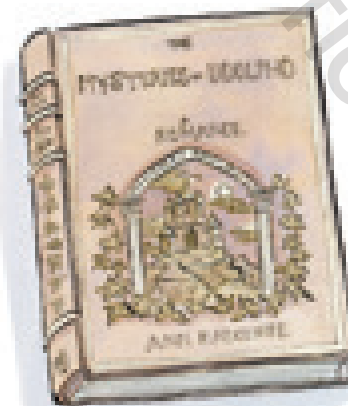


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THE CHARACTERS

NORTHANGER ABBEY

To be a true heroine, a girl must be beautiful and brave. She needs a wicked stepmother, like poor Cinderella, or a cruel father who locks her in a dark tower, or at least something that requires her to show her true mettle.

Our heroine, however, is different; perhaps even unique. Catherine Morland's appearance, like her name, was not likely to catch anybody's attention. Lively and playful as a child, Catherine did not pass lonely days gazing longingly through dusty windows, awaiting her handsome prince. Instead, she spent her childhood rolling down the green slope outside her house and playing happily with her nine brothers and sisters. Most surprisingly of all, Catherine's parents, in spite of having so many children to care for, were not only still living, but were happy and healthy. Although they were not very rich, neither were they very poor, and within the means available to them they

loved all their children equally. However great the temptation must sometimes have been, they had never locked a child in a tower or sold a single baby to a passing witch.

Having survived unscathed to the age of seventeen, Catherine was ready to seek adventure. Her only experience of the world consisted of the small community around her parents' home and the worlds she imagined as she sat enthralled by her books. No hero had ever galloped up to her house or leapt from the pages of her book. Even Catherine's parents agreed that the time had come for their daughter to experience new places and new faces.

When their neighbour, Mrs Allen, offered to take Catherine to the fashionable city of Bath for a few weeks, everybody was delighted. As Catherine sat in the carriage ready to depart, her mother gave her advice which would be valuable for any heroine setting out on her first

adventure: 'Make sure you keep account of the money you spend.' Catherine nodded, kissed her parents, and turned her eyes towards Bath.



Bath's Pump Rooms were the place to see and be seen. Understanding that a heroine ought to make a strong first impression, Mrs Allen was very particular about the gown Catherine should wear for her first appearance. Therefore, on her first full day in Bath, the finely-dressed Catherine stepped, wide-eyed, into the bustling Lower Rooms. Astonishingly, silence did not fall upon the crowd, and no gentleman gazed in rapturous wonder. One man, yawning, did comment to his friend that a girl who was 'almost pretty' had just entered the room. Almost unnoticed and almost pretty, our heroine took her first tentative steps into society.

Poor Catherine was overwhelmed by the largest crowd of people she had ever seen,

Henry to marry her. They all visit Henry's home at Woodston.

- Knowing their father's interest in money, Henry and Eleanor are confused by his kindness towards Catherine, but say nothing about it. They do not share his belief in her wealth.
- General Tilney is not present when Catherine receives her letter from James, and he himself does not receive a letter. The General bumps into John Thorpe on a business visit to London. This is when Thorpe tells him the truth about Catherine's wealth.
- Isabella is soon abandoned by Frederick Tilney.
- The insult to Catherine in being sent away is immense. General Tilney does not even allow a servant to accompany her.
- General Tilney's attitude towards Catherine and Henry softens when Eleanor marries a wealthy man.

Back in time

Northanger Abbey is Jane Austen's earliest major novel, but was only published after her death.

Like Catherine, Jane Austen visited Bath as a young woman. Bath was then a highly fashionable place to visit: a place for amusement, romance and adventure for the upper classes. The Pump Rooms and the Upper and Lower Rooms were places of public assembly. The role of the Master of Ceremonies was to introduce well-suited people for friendship or romance.

In Jane Austen's time, the relationship between marriage and money was very important. Women were neither expected nor adequately educated to work for a living. Marrying a wealthy man was the most respectable way to gain independence and achieve comfort. Isabella is guided by this consideration when she ends her engagement to James Morland. John Thorpe, too, hopes to improve his social status by marriage. Henry and Catherine, however, will marry for love.

Reading books was one way for people to both better and entertain themselves. Gothic horror fictions became extremely popular in the 1790s. *The Mysteries of Udolpho* by Ann Radcliffe would have been well-known. Such works, considered
