

Club - Place where students can go to meet each other.

To raise some money - To get some money.

The staff - The teachers at the school.

The common room - The room where students can sit and chat.

Make a plan - Decide what to do.

Athletics - The sport of competing in track and field events.

Fancy dress - You dress up in funny clothes / you dress up as someone else (for example Mickey Mouse or a spaceman).
